3 24-FA-01: THE DEMOCRATIC PARTY OF WISCONSIN CALLS FOR AN IMMEDIATE CEASEFIRE IN GAZA (99 WORDS)

- 5 WHEREAS, 66 Congress members called for immediate ceasefire in Gaza, with Representative Pocan
- 6 "warning that without one, this war leads to further loss of civilian life and risks dragging the U.S. into
- 7 unwise conflict";
- 8 WHEREAS, 28,000+ Palestinians have been killed, majority being women and minors;
- 9 WHEREAS, collective punishment of Palestinians is an egregious violation of humanitarian law and is,
- according to South Africa's ICJ case, genocide; and,
- 11 WHEREAS, the U.N. Secretary General, General Assembly, WHO, Jewish Voice for Peace, and 80% of
- 12 Democrats, according to polls, support an immediate ceasefire;
- 13 THEREFORE, RESOLVED, DPW calls for an immediate, unconditional ceasefire.

24-FA-02: RESOLUTION CALLING FOR THE ADOPTION OF THE BIDEN PEACE PLAN: CEASEFIRE, THE RETURN OF ALL HOSTAGES AND HUMAN REMAINS, AND THE DELIVERY OF HUMANITARIAN AID TO GAZA (86 WORDS)

- 17 WHEREAS, The Hamas terrorist attacks on Israel made October 7, 2023, the deadliest day for Jews since
- 18 the Holocaust;
- 19 WHEREAS, Hamas murdered, raped, and took hostage innocent American and Israeli civilians;
- 20 WHEREAS, the war in Gaza has triggered a humanitarian crisis causing the death, injury, and
- 21 displacement of civilians;
- THEREFORE, RESOLVED, the DPW calls for the immediate adoption by all parties of the Biden Peace
- Plan, leading to a ceasefire, the return of all hostages and human remains, and the delivery of
- 24 humanitarian aid to Gaza.

24-FA-03: SUPPORT FOR UKRAINE AID (71 WORDS)

- WHEREAS, assisting Ukraine with its defense against the unprovoked invasion by Russia is in the national
- 28 interest of the United States;
- WHEREAS, other European countries are in danger if Russia is allowed to continue its transgressions
- 30 unopposed; and,
- 31 WHEREAS, Ukraine is likely to lose its war with Russia without ongoing aid from the United States;
- 32 THEREFORE, RESOLVED, the DPW supports immediate action to provide adequate military and non-
- 33 military aid to Ukraine.

RESOLUTIONS CONCERNING EDUCATION, LABOR, AND ECONOMICS

38 24-ELE-01: Adopt a Student Bill of Rights into State Law (99 words)

- 39 WHEREAS, special interests are using veiled talking points on parental rights to limit access to
- 40 educational materials, demonize educators, and attack public schools;
- WHEREAS, many so-called parental rights policies are attempts to harm the lives of LGBTQ+ students,
- 42 especially those identifying as transgender;

- 1 WHEREAS, students should have the strongest voice in decision making on their education; and,
- 2 WHEREAS, schools should offer opportunities that are relevant to the future and its leaders;
- 3 THEREFORE, RESOLVED, the Wisconsin Legislature should adopt a Student Bill of Rights to increase the
- 4 power of the student voice, expand learning opportunities, and protect vulnerable student populations.

24-ELE-02: Stop The Harmful Effects of Gentrification (100 words)

- WHEREAS, many Wisconsin communities deal with concerns of displacement and low youth retention;
- 8 WHEREAS, there are proven strategies that reduce displacement from gentrification;
- 9 THEREFORE, RESOLVED, communities could be preserved through proactive code enforcement using
- subsidized home repair programs for senior and low-income housing, prohibiting large-scale
- developments in at-risk neighborhoods, and improving residential infrastructure;
- 12 RESOLVED, cities should establish Community Land Trusts in underserved neighborhoods and increase
- renter protections and legal rights to prevent displacement; and,
- 14 RESOLVED, local hire mandates and Project Labor Agreements should be allowed in Wisconsin;
- 15 FINALLY, RESOLVED, federal fair housing rules should be re-written to promote equitable investments.

24-ELE-03: RESOLUTION FOR STRENGTHENING LABOR UNIONS AND ECONOMIC JUSTICE BY REPEALING ACT 10 AND RIGHT TO WORK LAWS (92 WORDS)

- WHEREAS, the rate of workers pay has not increased at the same rate as CEO pay and rising cost of
- 20 living;
- 21 WHEREAS, corporate profits are at an all-time high and wealth is not trickling down;
- WHEREAS, Act 10 and Right to Work Laws are keeping wages low and disenfranchising Wisconsin
- 23 teachers, nurses and other unions; and,
- 24 WHEREAS, the average annual Wisconsin household income needs to meet paycheck to paycheck needs
- with the median cost-of-living;
- THEREFORE, RESOLVED, the DPW supports unionizing in all industries while repealing Act 10 and Right
- to Work Laws.

24-ELE-04: RESOLUTION TO LOWER PRESCRIPTION DRUG PRICES (99 WORDS)

- WHEREAS, the U.S. continues to have significantly higher prescription drug prices due to limited
- 31 competition, research and development costs, price hikes, and lack of regulation;
- WHEREAS, there is an urgent need to alleviate the burden of exorbitant prescription drug prices on
- individuals and healthcare systems, particularly the most vulnerable; and,
- WHEREAS, state and federal governments have proven the effectiveness of lowering prescription drug
- prices by facilitating generic drug competition, negotiating drug prices, and promoting transparency in
- 36 pharmaceutical pricing;
- 37 THEREFORE, RESOLVED, DPW supports legislation that encourages public research into prescription
- drugs, increases competition, and lowers prices through government negotiated prices.

40 **24-ELE-05:** Resolution for Teacher and Educator Shortages and Funding for School Supplies 41 **(100** words)

42 WHEREAS, the U.S Department of Education is reporting record public school educator shortages;

- 1 WHEREAS, this shortage has several factors including teachers pay, benefits and an inadequate budget
- 2 for school supplies; and,
- 3 WHEREAS, teachers often spend their own money for student supplies because they are dependent on
- 4 parents to donate school supplies to get through the school year;
- 5 THEREFORE, RESOLVED, DPW supports funding for teachers and educators including but not limited to
- 6 an increase in pay, increased benefits, higher budget for school supplies, free mental health counseling,
- 7 grants and scholarships for teaching degrees, certificates, graduate programs and other educational
- 8 related programs.

10 24-ELE-06: RESOLUTION FOR EARLY CHILDHOOD DEVELOPMENT SCREENING AND INDIVIDUALIZED **EDUCATION PROGRAMS IN RURAL WISCONSIN (85 WORDS)** 11

- 12 WHEREAS, rural communities have a shortage of early childhood developmental screenings;
- 13 WHEREAS, screenings can catch delays at an early age;
- 14 WHEREAS, screenings include speech therapy, occupational therapy, gross motor skills, social and
- 15 emotional behavior, and others; and,
- 16 WHEREAS, early detection of these delays can give the child resources necessary to catch up and to
- 17 reduce or eliminate an effect on the childhood and adult development;
- 18 THEREFORE, RESOLVED, DPW supports early childhood development screens in rural areas with
- 19 resources to complete the Individualized Education Program (IEP).

24-ELE-07: RESOLUTION TO EXPAND AFFORDABLE CHILDCARE AND EMPOWER FAMILIES IN THE WORKFORCE (98 WORDS)

- 22
- 23 WHEREAS, prioritizing the well-being and development of children at an early age is the foundation of a 24 strong workforce, promoting equity and opportunity;
- 25 WHEREAS, affordable, accessible, and quality childcare options are limited for many Wisconsin parents
- 26 and caregivers, particularly in rural areas; and,
- 27 WHEREAS, the cost and availability of care often requires parents or caregivers to stay at home,
- 28 removing that individual from the workforce;
- 29 THEREFORE, RESOLVED, DPW supports state and federal investment in quality childcare by providing
- 30 guaranteed child tax credits, incentivizing businesses for on-site childcare, and fostering partnerships with
- 31 community organizations to expand affordable care options.

24-ELE-08: ALLEVIATING FOOD INSECURITY FOR K-12 STUDENTS (91 WORDS)

- 34 WHEREAS, 23% of Wisconsinites are "Food Insecure";
- 35 WHEREAS, 80% of SNAP recipients in WI are below 200% of the Federal Poverty Level;
- 36 WHEREAS, 60% of Wisconsin is a "Food Desert;"
- 37 WHEREAS, negative social stigma regarding free and reduced lunch affects student self-esteem;
- 38 WHEREAS, students who eat breakfast have documented improved academic performance; and,
- 39 WHEREAS, food insecurity disproportionately affects students' ability to learn, correlating to poor learning
- 40 outcomes;
- 41 THEREFORE, RESOLVED, free breakfast/lunch must be available to all K-12 students to eliminate stigma,
- 42 improve academic performance, and enhance overall health and social outcomes.

- 1 24-ELE-09: RESOLUTION TO AMEND 26 U.S.C., CHAPTER 21 (INTERNAL REVENUE CODE) BY INCLUDING
- 2 ALL FORMS OF INCOME SUBJECT TO TAXATION IN TITLE A SHALL BE SUBJECT TO FICA AND MEDICARE
- 3 TAXES WITHOUT A CAP THEREON (100 WORDS)
- 4 WHEREAS, Social Security and Medicare are in danger of being unable to pay benefits in the future;
- 5 WHEREAS, they currently rely solely on earned income;
- 6 WHEREAS, there is a cap on the amount of income that is taxable; and,
- WHEREAS, requiring all forms of income to be taxed as support of Social Security and Medicare shall
- 8 resolve any funding crisis;
- 9 THEREFORE, RESOLVED, that 26 U.S.C., Chapter 21 be amended by imposing on all income subject to
- 10 tax in Title A of said IRC the taxes imposed by Chapter 21 as amended and without any cap on income to
- 11 be taxed.

24-ELE-10: SUPPORT OF PUBLIC EDUCATION (61 WORDS)

- 14 WHEREAS, public schools are critical to having an informed populace;
- WHEREAS, an informed populace is crucial to a well-functioning democracy; and,
- 16 WHEREAS, adequate public funding is vital for quality public schools;
- 17 THEREFORE, RESOLVED, DPW resolves that all public funds dedicated to education be spent on
- developing, maintaining, and improving public education; and,
- 19 FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Wisconsin Voucher program be abolished.

24-ELE-11: LOCAL GOVERNMENT FUNDING (85 WORDS)

- WHEREAS, the State of Wisconsin has had a surplus fund totaling billions of dollars for several years;
- WHEREAS, the State of Wisconsin has set regulations on local Governmental bodies, capping their ability
- 24 to raise taxes and fees to meet yearly budgets; and,
- 25 WHEREAS, The State of Wisconsin has created a situation that forces local governments to make major
- 26 cuts to services and personnel;
- 27 THEREFORE, RESOLVED, DPW supports state laws that substantially increase revenue sharing and the
- removal of revenue caps on all local government units.

RESOLUTIONS CONCERNING AGRICULTURE AND ENVIRONMENTAL AFFAIRS

- 24-AGE-01: RESOLUTION FOR UPGRADING ELECTRIC GRID INFRASTRUCTURE AND PRIORITIZING
- 34 EXPANSION OF DIVERSE, CLEAN ENERGY PRODUCTION (100 WORDS)
- WHEREAS, there is a shortage of renewable and clean energy, due to a lack of investment in
- 36 infrastructure for these technologies;
- WHEREAS, this country has successfully spent hundreds of billions of dollars over one hundred plus years
- 38 on infrastructure for fossil fuels equating to large supplies and cheaper costs;
- 39 WHEREAS, to meet future demands for electrification, the electric grid will need significant updates;
- 40 THEREFORE, RESOLVED, DPW supports the funding of electric grid infrastructure updates to support
- 41 renewable energy including the exploration and development of safe hydrogen, thermal, nuclear,
- 42 biomass, wind, and solar in order to lower costs and increase supply.

1 24-AGE-02: RE-ESTABLISHING POSITIONS AT THE DNR (67 WORDS)

- WHEREAS, Wisconsin residents depend on the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources to maintain a
- 3 healthy environment;
- 4 WHEREAS, the department has eliminated most of its science-based positions;
- 5 WHEREAS, the department has also eliminated many enforcement positions; and,
- 6 WHEREAS, Wisconsin has long prided itself on having sound, science-based, properly enforced,
- 7 environmental policy;
- 8 THEREFORE, RESOLVED, DPW supports the re-establishment of recently eliminated enforcement and
- 9 science-based positions at the Wisconsin DNR.

24-AGE-03: RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF SUSTAINABLE REGENERATIVE FARMING (98 WORDS)

- WHEREAS, there are 1258 Wisconsin waterways classified as impaired for phosphorus primarily from
- agricultural runoff per numerous DNR/USDA/UW studies;
- 14 WHEREAS, in agricultural areas, such as the highly cultivated regions in south-central Wisconsin,
- approximately 30% of private well samples exceed the Maximum Contamination Level of 10 ppm for
- 16 nitrates; and,
- WHEREAS, Regenerative farming practices allow agriculturalists to create ideal habitation for soil
- 18 microbes that deliver restorative nutrients to plants that improve soils, increase the nutritional value of
- 19 the food produced at far less cost and without harmful runoff;
- THEREFORE, RESOLVED, DPW should demand legislation which prioritizes Regenerative Agricultural
- 21 Practices.

23 **24-AGE-04: UTV/ATV USE ON PUBLIC ROADS (79 WORDS)**

- WHEREAS, the State of Wisconsin has specific rules/laws for motorized vehicles operating on public
- 25 roadways;
- WHEREAS, the State of Wisconsin has regulations on drivers and vehicles using public roadways,
- 27 including a valid driver's license and insurance coverage; and,
- WHEREAS, many communities have adopted ordinances allowing UTV/ATV drivers to use certain public
- 29 roadways.
- THEREFORE, RESOLVED, DPW supports state laws requiring UTV/ATV vehicles using public roadways be
- 31 held to appropriate rules, laws and regulations to protect the safety of the community.

RESOLUTIONS CONCERNING JUSTICE, HUMANS CONCERNS, AND

35 **DEMOCRACY**

- 37 **24-JHD-01:** END MASS INCARCERATION (97 WORDS)
- WHEREAS, the United States has the largest incarcerated population in the world, with over 1.8 million
- 39 people incarcerated;
- WHEREAS, nearly 75% of those incarcerated are serving time for non-violent offenses; and,
- WHEREAS, the US annually spends \$80,000,000,000 on incarceration;
- 42 THEREFORE, RESOLVED, the USA must end mass incarceration;

- 1 FURTHER RESOLVED, incarceration should be eliminated as a penalty for most non-violent offenses,
- 2 especially those stemming from mental illness and addiction;
- 3 FURTHER RESOLVED, treatment and rehabilitation alternatives and re-entry programs must receive major
- 4 investment; and,
- 5 FINALLY, RESOLVED, the United States should conduct regular systemic audits of our criminal justice
- 6 system.

8 24-JHD-02: REFORM POLICING (100 WORDS)

- 9 WHEREAS, for many years Wisconsinites have demanded reforms to law enforcement that protect civil
- 10 liberties:
- 11 WHEREAS, there has not been meaningful statewide action to address these demands; and,
- 12 WHEREAS, Americans should stand as defenders of true justice and oppose systemically racist policies;
- 13 THEREFORE, RESOLVED, DPW calls for statewide reform on Use of Force policies for police and creation
- 14 of a national database on police misconduct;
- 15 FURTHER RESOLVED, law enforcement funding should be coordinated with crime prevention through
- 16 social services, improved healthcare and work hours for first responders, and improving emergency
- 17 response times; and,
- 18 FINALLY, RESOLVED, Congress should replace qualified immunity.

19

20 **24-JHD-03:** ALLOW CITIZEN INITIATED BINDING REFERENDUMS IN WISCONSIN (97 WORDS)

- 21 WHEREAS, there is no method for the people of Wisconsin to utilize direct democracy;
- 22 WHEREAS, 15 States allow citizens to initiate binding referendums for Statute and Constitutional
- 23 Amendments, and 10 additional states allow some variation of this;
- 24 WHEREAS, Wisconsin residents have repetitively been asked their opinions through non-binding
- resolutions on subjects, but have received no action after giving clear opinions;
- WHEREAS, many States have seen huge progressive victories through direct democracy; and,
- WHEREAS, government should be of, by, and for the people;
- 28 THEREFORE, RESOLVED, Wisconsin should allow citizen initiated binding ballot referendums on Statute
- and Constitutional Amendments.

24-JHD-04: RESOLUTION ABOUT IMMIGRATION IN WISCONSIN (99 WORDS)

- WHEREAS, Wisconsin has a history of being enriched by the contributions of immigrants, who are vital
- members of Wisconsin's labor force in a range of industries;
- 34 WHEREAS, immigrants in Wisconsin have contributed billions of dollars in taxes; and,
- 35 WHEREAS, crises around the world have created a need for safe haven for people who can no longer
- 36 safely reside in their native areas, causing an influx of immigrants into the United States and Wisconsin;
- 37 THEREFORE, RESOLVED, DPW supports common sense immigration reform, assistance to communities
- where migrants are welcomed, easy-to-access guest worker programs, and support for individual and
- 39 family migrants.

24-JHD-05: MEDICAID EXPANSION (93 WORDS)

- WHEREAS, rural hospitals, healthcare services and medical clinics are failing in Wisconsin at the highest
- 3 rate in the nation;
- 4 WHEREAS, closings leave thousands of people without needed services resulting in more crisis situations
- 5 and deaths;
- 6 WHEREAS, medical facilities need adequate reimbursement for treatment services and unfunded patient
- 7 care to maintain operations;
- 8 WHEREAS, parity needed with those states accepting federal Medicaid expansion;
- 9 WHEREAS, medical staff re-employment and retraining becomes critical to established
- 10 care levels; and,
- WHEREAS, community and mental health care services should be supported;
- 12 THEREFORE RESOLVED, the adaptation of Medicaid expansion should occur.

14 **24-JHD-06:** RESOLUTION FOR REPRODUCTIVE JUSTICE IN WISCONSIN (98 WORDS)

- WHEREAS, The U.S. Supreme Court overturned Roe vs Wade, shifting the determination for abortion
- 16 access to state legislatures;
- WHEREAS, this has resulted in abortion access to be uncertain in Wisconsin, with a 2023 Dane County
- 18 Circuit Court ruling allowing abortion access under a 1985 state law which is likely to be challenged; and,
- 19 WHEREAS, the current Republican majority in the Wisconsin legislature refuses to take action on ensuring
- safe, legal abortions despite a majority of Wisconsinites being in favor;
- 21 THEREFORE, RESOLVED, DPW supports Wisconsin legislation that would protect abortion access,
- 22 mirroring that of other states such as Minnesota.

2324

24-JHD-08: Non-Partisan Redistricting Reform (75 words)

- WHEREAS, 72% of Wisconsinites support the creation of a non-partisan method to draw legislative and
- 26 congressional district maps;
- WHEREAS, gerrymandered districts discourage competition and legislators are not accountable to
- 28 constituents; and,
- 29 WHEREAS, the present Congressional District maps violate the Wisconsin Constitution requirement to
- 30 "...be in as compact form as practicable.";
- 31 THEREFORE, RESOLVED, DPW supports the permanent formation of a non-partisan redistricting
- 32 commission to draw maps for Wisconsin's state legislative and congressional districts after every census.

24-JHD-09: NATIONAL POPULAR VOTE COMPACT (100 WORDS)

- 35 WHEREAS, the Presidency is the only elected office where the Electoral College decides the winner;
- 36 WHEREAS, the Electoral College was created in 1787 and does not reflect the changes taken place the
- 37 last 237 years;
- 38 WHEREAS, the National Popular Vote Interstate Compact has been ratified by 35 states and 220 of the
- 39 270 votes needed for adoption;
- WHEREAS, 63% in the 2022 Pew Research poll support electing the President with the direct popular
- 41 vote; and,
- 42 WHEREAS, Wisconsin legislation is pending to support the National Popular Voter Interstate Compact;

1 THEREFORE, RESOLVED, DPW supports the adoption of the National Popular Vote Compact.

2

24-JHD-10: Pass the Reproductive Freedom Act (95 words)

- 4 WHEREAS, the 1849 Wisconsin law bans abortion with no exceptions for rape, incest, or the health of the
- 5 mother:
- 6 WHEREAS, the Reproductive Freedom Act (RFA) restores the power of individuals to make their own
- 7 pregnancy healthcare decisions; and,
- 8 WHEREAS, RFA allows health care providers to provide medically accurate information, patients the right
- 9 to receive medically accurate information from their health care provider, and ensures that publicly
- 10 funded pregnancy counseling facilities provide all-options counseling;
- 11 THEREFORE, RESOLVED, DPW supports the passage of the Reproductive Freedom Act as introduced by
- 12 State Senator Kelda Roys and Representative Francesca Hong.

24-JHD-11: AUTOMATIC WEAPONS BAN (95 WORDS)

- WHEREAS, the Second Amendment to the Constitution, ratified in 1791, protects "The right of the people
- 16 to keep and bear arms,";
